Second Graders Welcome Concord Fire Department for Fire Prevention Month

When we think of October, we often think about pumpkins, hayrides, and Halloween, but October also brings fire trucks! October is nationally recognized as Fire Prevention Month, and at Shaker Road School that means that second grade classes get a visit from the Concord Fire Department. This year's second grade classes were thrilled to not only get a peek inside a fire truck but also an ambulance!



On Friday, October 14, Concord Fire Department fire-fighters and EMTs came to teach our students about how to stay safe in case of a fire. Some of the topics discussed were to always have a family meeting place outside of your home, how to safely get out of your house, and what number to call in case of an emergency. The highlight of the group discussion was the race between Firefighter Dan and Firefighter Zach to see how fast they could get dressed in every piece of their fire gear. Both were able to do it in under a minute and thirty seconds. Impressive!

The real excitement came when the kids were able to explore and ask questions about the

fire truck and ambulance. The students asked a lot of questions about the tools they carry on the truck and what they are used for, how loud the sirens can be, and the difference between the various hoses. One fire hose can pump out 1,500 gallons of water a minute!

Fire Prevention Month is fun for the students at Shaker Road School, but it is also a great reminder for parents and teachers alike to have students practice their home address and check those



smoke detectors! The fire department recommends replacing the batteries in your smoke detectors every six months. A great way to remember this is to replace them each time we change the clocks. Once again, we sincerely thank the Concord Fire Department for visiting Shaker Road School and teaching us about fire prevention and safety.

Most of the lessons involved practical applications: ethical challenges like deciding who deserved a financial award or whether someone made the right choice in a "daily dilemma." The


most difficult challenges facing this group of stu-

Lake Winnisquam Trip



Our Sixth Grade students spent the week at Lake Winnisquam learning about watershed ecology and the history of the lake and railroad there. Doug Hicks took the students on a boat ride up to the large end of the lake to see the most significant inlet—the Winnipesaukee River—as well as some other lake features including Pot Island (adjacent to the deepest part of the lake), Mosquito Bridge, and the portion of the lake that leads to the dam in Lochmere where the water flows to Silver Lake, into the Merrimack River, and out to the ocean. Students used topographic maps to understand the watershed and understand where the water goes.

Students also created mini habitats in fish tanks to hold a wide variety of aquatic creatures. Students

looked for macroinvertebrates and learned how scientists describe the makeup of the bottom of the lake. They took samples of the lake bottom and ran them through a set of

classifier screens to determine the ratio of small rocks, sand, and silt. They were able to determine the quality of the water based on macroinvertebrates found and other analysis of the water.

Of course they fished and kayaked too, along with taking water samples and analyses from deeper portions of

the lake. It was a full week of hands-on science with Mr. Hicks, Mrs. Daniels, and Doug Hicks that made a lasting impact on our students and their understanding of our local watersheds!

AMC Adventures






Dear Zoë and Carmella,



New SRS Trail Signs!



My name is Ryley Chipman. I am an eighth grade student here at Shaker Road School. I am also a Girl Scout Cadette and have been a Girl Scout for seven years.

For the past year, I have been working on my Girl Scout Silver Award Project. The Silver Award is highest award that a Cadette can earn; its purpose is to find a "take action" project that will have a permanent impact on your community. To complete this project, I had to complete a minimum of 50 hours of service. Thanks to Mr. Matt and Mr. Hicks, I was able to complete those hours over the summer and this fall.


The first step was to chat with Doug and Mr. Matt about an idea. Over my years at Shaker, I have noticed that we have access to many beautiful trails right on campus for cross country, Nordic skiing, mountain biking and other school activities. The one challenge with the trails is there is no way of identifying where you are while on them. So, I proposed an idea of making trail signs.



Although it may seem like a basic idea, it included many steps. The first step was to drive through the trails and decide where we wanted the signs to go and what we wanted the trail names to be. We were able to come up with over 15 names and decided we would need around 27 signs in total. We then needed to choose the material of the signs, how we wanted to cut them, and the overall aesthetic look of the product.

We chose to go the sentimental route and decided to use the white oak from the big Shaker tree that came down a few years ago. Then I helped to move a 12-foot oak branch to the sawmill where we cut twenty-eight 2" x 6" x 16" pieces for the signs.

Mr. Hicks then showed me how to use the simulation software on my computer. This software allowed me to type in the trail names and position the words how I wanted them to look on the signs with correct font and size.



Once all the signs were sanded, I started painting them. Because the letters were carved into the wood, I then put them through a planer to take off the extra paint so only the letters were white. We drilled holes at the top and bottom of each sign so they could be hung. For the first few posts, Mr. Matt used an auger to drill into the ground, but then we decided we could easily do them by hand. We then secured the posts into the ground and drilled the signs onto the posts.

The next step will be to seal the signs now that we have them in the ground. And my hope is that the last step will be to make a trail map for students, faculty, and visitors.

During this process, I also had a yard sale to raise money for SRS. I raised \$1,000 to purchase the hardware for hanging the signs, and the school can use the rest of the funds to help with the sustainability of the trail maintenance over the years. I'd like to also take this opportunity to thank everyone in the SRS community who came to support my yard sale.

It was so much fun to work on this project. It feels really great to have finished one last project before graduating from SRS. I hope the signs are useful to anyone using the trails in the years to come. I would like to thank Mr. Hicks, Mr. Matt, and Doug for their many hours of support, especially in the brutal summer heat and being subjected to listening to my Christmas music in July.

I am so glad to have a lasting impact on this community.

Third/Fourth Grade Cross-Country


